

Reformation Sunday October 30, 2011


Many Protestant churches observe Reformation Sunday each year on the last Sunday of October to commemorate October 31, 1517, when *Martin Luther* tacked a sheet of paper to the door of the castle church in Wittenburg, Germany. That paper contained ninety-five statements



challenging the practice of selling pardon for sins by the Roman Catholic Church. Did he hope to start a debate, a reformation, or a revolution? Historians are not of one voice about this. What he did begin, however, was a transformation of western Christianity. While many other church leaders were involved in the Reformation of the Church, Martin Luther is the one identified as setting it

in motion. There are some others, too:

Guillaume Farel was a Swiss reformer and powerful preacher who openly debated with the opponents of the Reformation in Basel despite a rule against such debates from the city's Bishop and University. In 1535, he was banished from Basel and want to Copeya. He was the first to bring the idea of



Geneva and conduct its reform.



John Calvin was a French-born reformer who, at the invitation of Farel, conducted the Reformation of the church in Geneva beginning in 1536—nineteen years after Martin Luther's famous paper, nail, and door incident. Calvin's reformation of Geneva began slowly

and is the seed of modern-day Presbyterianism. After a year in Geneva he went to Strasbourg, France, for three years to assist in the reformation of that city. In 1540 he returned to Geneva and remained there the rest of his life. In a book about church prayers and songs written in 1542, he described the form of the normal order for worship on Sunday morning. That form has been a regular part of Presbyterian worship ever since.



Martin Bucer was a German priest who led the Reformation of the city of Strasbourg. Calvin spent three years with Bucer in Strasbourg lecturing in Theology. Bucer and Calvin used the text from Acts 2:42 to identify the four necessary elements of worship: word, prayer, meal, and alms. Calvin wrote, Luke related in the Acts that this was the practice of the Apostolic church...thus

it became the unvarying rule that no meeting of the church should take place without the Word, prayers, partaking of the Lord's Supper, and almsgiving. (*Institutes*, 4.17.44) In a fragmenting western Church, Bucer worked through his life to find unity and common ground.

John Knox was a Scottish church leader who sought refuge in Geneva at a time when the British monarch, Mary Tudor, was putting Protestants in prison (1553). In Geneva he studied the ideas of the Reformation with Calvin and then served as the pastor to an English-speaking congregation consisting of other protestant refugees in that city. In

1558 he returned to Scotland, when it was safe for Protestants again under a new Queen of England, Elizabeth I. Once home, he began the Presbyterian reformation of Scotland. Knox wrote the *Scots Confession* in 1560.



Theodore Beza was a French-born theologian who in 1558 was invited by Calvin to become a professor in the new "Academie Geneve." In 1560, Beza published a popular edition of Calvinist beliefs and a year later published a translation of the Psalms. When Calvin died in 1563, Beza became the leader of the Swiss Calvinists. He continued to write and publish scholarly work from

Geneva including an edition of the Greek New Testament which is still consulted today. Its name is *Codex Bazae*.

With many other church leaders, these six reformers were committed to the five "solas" of the Reformation:

Sola Fides – Faith Alone Sola Gratia – Grace Alone Sola Scriptura – Scripture Alone Solus Christus – Christ Alone Soli Deo Gloria – To God Alone be Glory
